LGBT VOICES FROM HISTORY - EDWARD CARPENTER IN SHEFFIELD



Rony Robinson and Sally Goldsmith, long-time admirers of Carpenter, will explore the history of Edward Carpenter, one of the first gay rights activists, who lived in Sheffield at the turn of the century. An important social reformer, Carpenter fought for workers' rights, women's emancipation, clean air, sustainable living, and many other causes that resonate fully in our world today. Carpenter lived openly as a gay man at the time of Oscar Wilde's trial and imprisonment. He wrote publicly about homosexuality, corresponding with Siegfried Sassoon and others on the subject, as well as igniting the passion in E.M. Forster to write Maurice!

Rony and Sally will present a fascinating opportunity to meet with an LGBT voice from our local past. This will include a performance of Carpenter's socialist hymn 'England Arise!' especially adapted for Brass Band by the Woodhouse Prize Band.

Special screening of the British film that recently won the *Queer Palm Award* at Cannes. Pride is based on the true story of how a group of gay activists decided to raise money to support the families of striking miners in 1984, forming bonds between the two very different communities.














Friends of Edward Carpenter are a group of people who are dedicated to establishing a permanent memorial to Edward Carpenter in Sheffield City Centre, recognising his historical and social importance and unique association with the city.

Edward Carpenter (1844 -1929) was a significant cultural and political activist, who advocated the 'Simplification of Life' and put his beliefs into practice. He campaigned throughout his life on many issues of social concern, ranging from women's suffrage to the protection of the environment, from sexual emancipation to the formation of trade unions. For over forty years he formed a strong bond with the people of Sheffield, living openly as a gay man in Millthorpe, Derbyshire only a few

miles away. His life was one of quiet celebration while his writings and example laid the foundation for the gay liberation movement of the twentieth century. Through his many friendships, Edward Carpenter transversed the divisions of class, gender, sexuality, race and creed. Men and women from across the world and from all walks of life came into connection with each other through him and his connections with Sheffield and home at Millthorpe.

Our aim is to connect with the diverse worldwide population of interested people to establish the memorial. This is a big task, and we will be seeking local, national and international support to achieve this.

Primarily, we need to raise the funds required to establish a fitting memorial for Edward Carpenter, one that will provide both a concrete and spiritual focus for all who are inspired and influenced by him. We aim to commission a work of public art that has integrity and that will ensure a respectful place of pilgrimage, meditation, celebration and memorial in the heart of the City of Sheffield.
